"HOPE IN THE EYES"

Joey boarded with a group from Queens University of Charlotte, the airplane that would take him to Guatemala without knowing what he would find in that country that seemed so tiny on the map and so wounded in its history. Joey never imagined that, one week later, he and many others in his group would return to their homes in the United States completely transformed. It was March, 2009.

Joey reflected that, "During that week, I was able to see true community throughout Guatemala. Yes, I observed many problems in that tiny country that still suffers from the atrocities committed during the thirty-six years that the internal armed conflict lasted. Nevertheless, I was also able to see the light of hope in the eyes of many people."

Two years later, Joey was on the plane that would take him to Guatemala again...

"From the first day I was in Guatemala, I knew that I had to return. The people in CEDEPCA made me feel at home; they received me as if I were part of a large family. In my second visit, I was able to discover more clearly the joy and hope that inhabited the hearts of the Guatemalan people."

When Joey left Guatemala the second time, he felt challenged. He had more questions than the first time – questions to which he would only find answers with the passage of time.

Four more years would pass before Joey would return to Guatemala. Joey had changed; Guatemala had changed. The country was now living through one of its most intense political moments, but also one of its most hopeful. Joey returned to Guatemala in 2015, this time as a student of Union Presbyterian Seminary (Charlotte, NC). He had decided to respond to the call to dedicate his life to the Reign of God.

"The focus of my third trip to Guatemala was 'Faith and Identity'; the faith experience was fascinating. It was marvelous to learn more about Mayan spirituality, its roots and its practices."

"Each one of these journeys has had an enormous impact on my life. My perspective about migration, religion, poverty, economics, politics, and human rights were changed drastically by each minute that I lived in that beautiful country. I am very thankful for the opportunity to learn and deepen my faith during my time in Guatemala. I have learned that there is much that we can learn from one another if we give ourselves the opportunity to open our eyes, hearts and minds."

The story of Joey and Guatemala did not end in 2015. The story continues to be written; the next chapter will be in 2017, when Joey returns as a guide/facilitator for a group of students from the same university with which he traveled to Guatemala for the first time in 2009. This time, Joey knows what to expect. He knows very well that, once again, Guatemala will teach him many things, and that it will challenge him to live in solidarity with each person in whatever place in the world he finds himself.



"MENDING A PAIR OF SHOES, A TRANSFORMED LIFE"

Two years ago, in the midst of my daily routine, a transformation happened in my life. It was through a very ordinary action: mending a pair of shoes. You see, my wife's favorite pair of shoes broke and she was sad. I suggested she go to the market, as I was sure she would find a cobbler who could fix her favorite shoes. She went to the market, and in fact, she found a cobbler that did more than just fix her shoes, he helped us to mend and transform our lives. The cobbler was also an evangelical minister, a newscaster, and student of Bible and Theology. While he was working on her shoes, the pastor listened to my wife's concerns about our family's condition.

My name is Rolando Hernandez Gonzales. I am 64 years old and a student at the Road to Emmaus Theological Seminary of CEDEPCA. Eight years ago I had a stroke that affected my life physically and emotionally and we were forced to face a series of family issues that only worsened my health. Our problems were so serious that I thought I was going crazy and sometimes I thought about committing suicide. However, my trust in God

held me even though at that time I was attending an evangelical church and wasn't receiving any pastoral support.

When the cobbler finished fixing my wife's shoes, he asked her to go and look for me so we could pray together. That is how our friendship began. He then encouraged me to study Bible and Theology at the Road to Emmaus Seminary.

At the beginning, I didn't want to do it because I felt I was disabled. I had difficulty walking and it was hard for me to read and write. Loud noises bothered me. Nevertheless, I started to attend classes even though I was afraid and ashamed. I even fell asleep! But I was strengthened to learn in an atmosphere of Christ and in the presence of the Holy Spirit. Now I am very happy when I go to study. This has been a wonderful time in my life.

To study Bible and Theology has been a therapy for my recovery. I have started to read and write again! I have recovered from most of my physical disabilities and my life has been transformed.

In one course, I learned about the jubilee year, and I think that God brought joy into my life as well as freedom and transformation. I have learned from my professor of Christology that you must not only read the Bible, but interpret it and then act on it. "Jesus is action."

Now, in spite of my physical barriers, I serve in my congregation in the discipleship ministry. I teach others and I think I do it with a knowledge and authority because of the preparation that I received through my studies.

I plan to continue studying in the Road to Emmaus Seminary and hope to finish the Biblical and Pastoral Institute Level and begin the University Level.

I pray and give thanks for the facilitators that come to teach us. But I also pray and give thanks for the donors of CEDEPCA so we can have the opportunity to learn. I ask that God will bless the CEDEPCA ministry because it was the door that God opened to transform my life and family.



We are part of the Ecumenical Latin American and Caribbean Theological Community - CETELA [the network of institutions affiliated with the Latin American Biblical University].

OBJECTIVE: To encourage the formation of ecclesial, academic and/or community leadership prepared to analyze their contexts, to reflect biblically and theologically, and to engage in transformative actions in their churches, in the places where they teach, and in their communities.

OBJECTIVE: To develop critical thinking in women so that, as empowered women, they can contribute to the deconstruction of patriarchal and androcentric structures, and to the construction of equal and equitable relationships in their surroundings.

In 2016, The Women's Ministry worked with:





- women in courses
- women in workshops
- women in celebrations and commemorations
 - **85** women supported with psychological, legal and pastoral counseling
 - women attended the Anne Sayre Maternal Home, Cahabón. A.V
 - 195 women in Prayer Shawl ministries
 - women served as volunteer facilitators
 - women participated in different activities of training and in women's networks
 - men participated in workshops, celebrations and clinics

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
CEDEPCA's Disaster Ministry (PAD) is a training program that works to prevent, reduce and attend to the damage caused by disasters arising from natural phenomena. We work in high-risk, highly vulnerable communities with a holistic view of people's needs: physical, psychological and spiritual.

OBJECTIVE: To strengthen the capacity of individual and community resilience in order to lessen the physical, psychological and spiritual impact of humanitarian crisis.

In 2016, The Disaster Ministry provided:

A) Courses and workshops

Participants in courses, workshops, and other psychosocial and disaster preparation activities



B) Humanitarian aid:

3577

people received humanitarian aid

- 1385 people affected by drought received cash transfers
 - 92 people received psychosocial assistance in emergencies
 - 915 people affected by drought received seeds for family gardens in Quetzaltenango
 - 175 personal hygiene kits were delivered in Cambray II at Santa Catarina Pinula, Guatemala
- 835 people benefited with water filters in Pachaj, Quetzaltenango
- 175 people benefited with food bags at Cuilapa Santa Rosa. Bags included products such as rice, black beans, sugar, corn flour, Incaparina, milk and salt

Intercultural Encounters is a program that designs and facilitates experiences of encounter, reflection, dialogue and mutual service between people from the United States and Canada with Central American communities, aimed at the creation of a more just, tolerant and equitable world.

OBJECTIVE: To strengthen dialogue and cooperation between people from different countries and cultures for [the purposes of] prayer, mutual learning and the joining of efforts to create more just churches and communities.


